THE FIFTH GLOBAL FORUM ON **Pharmaceutical AntiCounterfeiting**

End-to-End Protection - from API to Patient

There has been a huge increase in awareness of the dangers of counterfeit medicines since the first Global Forum in 2002. The pharmaceutical industry, national drug regulators, law enforcement agencies, international organizations and healthcare professionals have never been more active in combating fake medicines and medical devices. Nonetheless, the problem persists and may even be on the rise in many parts of the world, including the Americas and Europe.

So the question is no longer "what's the nature of the problem?" but "how to collaborate to combat the problem and what is the best way to do so?"

With its established and exceptional mix of stakeholder participation, the Global Forum on Pharmaceutical AntiCounterfeiting provides an ideal forum to discuss these questions. Collaboration between the pharma industry, DRAs, customs and police, pharmacists, doctors, nurses, policy makers and patients is now generally recognized as essential for the most effective policies to combat fakes. The Global Forum brings these groups together, but adds another essential stakeholder element: suppliers of anti-counterfeiting services and technologies. This makes the Forum a unique opportunity to see the latest in anti-counterfeiting technologies and to hear how they are - or could be - applied by individual companies, DRAs or consortia. The Forum is proven to stimulate collaborations through contacts made and ideas generated during the event, because it is the only event that brings all these essential stakeholders together.

With improved awareness and programs to fight fakes, protection from end-to-end, from the supply of active pharmaceutical ingredients (APIs) to the patient, is recognized as vital. That is why this is the theme for the

fifth Global Forum, with the first session of the plenary program including papers that will show why this is the case: budgets are hit, supply chains are compromised, generics are challenged. On the other hand, national and international anti-counterfeiting policies are required, including financial aid and cross-border support.

The second and third sessions examine the issues along the supply chain, from bulk ingredients to the patient, with company and DRA case studies showing how to be effective in detecting counterfeits and protecting patients.

And throughout the program there are case studies and presentations on ways to detect fakes to help you find the best technology to deploy in specific situations. Is it RFID, data matrix or another coding system that will help e-pedigree become a reality? What is the role of advanced techniques such as Raman spectroscopy, of taggants (now classed as PCIDs by the FDA), holograms, capseals? Is there a place for mobile phone-based recognition systems, and other emerging methods and technologies?

With its mix of anti-counterfeiting suppliers and other stakeholders, your participation in the Global Forum on Pharmaceutical AntiCounterfeiting will give you the best insights and follow-up contacts to apply in your own situation. And if you wish to have a deeper insight in to the issues around parallel trade (in the EU) and reimportation (in the US) then the first Workshop on February 24th will provide just that! While the Workshop Course on Authentication and Traceability will help you understand how these functions complement each other for the most effective anti-counterfeiting strategy.

Parallel Trade and Reimportation: European and American Perspectives

Jim Thomson, *European Alliance for Access to Safe Medicines*
Marvin D Shepherd, *Center for Pharmacoeconomic Studies, University of Texas; Director, SafeMeds*

What does parallel trade mean for European pharmaceutical distributors and patients? What lessons are there in the European experience for the USA as it considers its reimportation policy? And what can Europe learn from the US experience? As the EU and the US consider the issue of parallel trade and reimportation, this workshop brings the knowledge and expertise of two leading opinion formers in each region to examine the issues. Through participating in this workshop you will gain up to date knowledge of the latest policy developments, insights in to the issue and how it could affect you as a patient and your organization in terms of management of the distribution chain.

Course Leaders:

Jim Thomson is a firm advocate of patients' right to be protected from fake medicines. He founded the European Alliance in 2006 and it has rapidly become established at the heart of European policy making. The Alliance's first project was a report on medicines' distribution in Europe, which examined parallel trade and has proved a seminal work. He is European liaison and a director of the Partnership for Safe Medicines.

Marvin D Shepherd, in addition to his University position, is Chairman of the Partnership for Safe Medicines. He has researched and published widely on drug importation, in both specialist and general media, including CNN, NPR, Wall St Journal and the NY Times. He has also testified on the issue before Congress.

David Howard has many years experience in devising and implementing anti-counterfeiting and anti-diversion procedures which recognize the difference between knowing where your product is and whether it is genuine. He is first Chairman of the International Authentication Association.

John Spink has devised and introduced an Anti-Counterfeiting in-service distance learning course program at MSU, probably the first of its kind anywhere. He therefore fully understands the demands of packaging managers, security managers and others in understanding and implementing anti-counterfeiting strategies.
